In addition to male and female veterans, the stand-down also supports wives of indigent veterans. Ann noted the stand-down also took clothes in good condition like suits and shirts but did not have a lot of clothes for women. She noted it "could be a good opportunity for us to clean out our closets next year."

WWII MIA TSgt Seifried To Be Interned at Marana Veteran's Memorial Cemetery

The Defense Prisoner of War and Missing in Action Accounting Agency (DPAA) announced that Army Air Forces Technical Sergeant Harlod L Seifreid, 31, of Philadelphia, PA, killed during WWII, was accounted for on Nov 21, 2023. TSgt Seifreid will be buried Friday, April 19, 2024, at noon at the Marana Veteran's Memorial Cemetery, 15950 N Luckett Rd.

Seifreid was the radio operator on the B24J Liberator tail# 42-73196 assigned to the 436th Bombardment Squadron, 7th Bombardment Group, 10th Air Force. They were part of a formation of B-24s on a bombing mission to the Insein Railroad Yard north of Rangoon, Burma. After the bombing run, the B-24 was hit in the left wing by anti-aircraft fire, began smoking badly, and dove sharply to the left chased by three enemy fighters. They were last seen descending into a cloud bank. He received the Air Medal and Purple Heart.

MOAA's annual Advocacy in Action (AiA) campaign, including the April 17 Hill visit to all Senate and House offices, takes place midmonth. MOAA Chapter members from across the country will educate Legislators on three

If you click the links below, you will go directly to the MOAA Action Center to contact our congressional members to ask them to support MOAA's priorities before the April 17th AiA visits. Our congressional members must know there is grassroots support for these important issues. The 2024 priorities are:

Support Combat-Injured Veterans

The Ask: The Major Richard Star Act would end an unjust pay offset that prevents tens of thousands of retired servicemembers from receiving the compensation they deserve. Ask Congress to include the bill in the upcoming National Defense Authorization Act. In our catchment area, Senators Kelly and Sinema have signed on to the Senate bill. Rep. Grijalva was an original co-sponsor of the House bill, and pressure from MOAA members, among others, has moved Rep. Ciscomani to sign on.

Restore the Basic Allowance for Housing The Ask: Ever-growing housing costs are just one of the financial challenges faced by servicemembers and their families, especially young enlisted personnel. Ask Congress to ensure BAH again covers 100% of housing costs.

Protect TRICARE For Life

The Ask: This earned benefit is under threat -unfair fees and cost shares now under
consideration are misguided cost-saving options.
Ask Congress to reject these ideas not just for
current retirees, but to protect future generations
of servicemembers.

Arizona Legislative News: We need you to continue to push our state representatives in the

Senate and House to support these important legislation!

S.B. 1413 had its third read in the Senate mid-March and passed, and has had its second reading in the House. The bill expands the individual income tax subtraction for active service compensation to include compensation received for active service in the U.S. Uniformed Services, rather than the U.S. Armed Forces. Our catchment area state legislators have not signed on. Please contact our state Senators and Representatives to ensure they support this important bill.

S.B. 1206 Military Spouse Tuition has passed the Senate and was placed on the House consent calendar in mid-March. Both the Majority and Minority Caucus have said yes. Please encourage our local House members to vote yes when the bill comes to the floor.

SB1375, died in Committee vote in early March. The bill, introduced last session, would have amended current law to include NOAA and USPHS active members in the active duty pay exemption in ARS 43-1022

The Tucson and CMC member catchment areas are comprised of Legislative Districts 17,18, 20, and a part of 21.

Millions of Vets Exposed to Toxins Eligible for biological weapons or nerve agents. VA Health Care on March 5th.

Millions of U.S. veterans are eligible beginning March 5th for health care with the Department of Veterans Affairs under an accelerated effort to provide benefits and services to those exposed to toxic substances while serving.

The VA announced that all veterans who have served in a combat zone since the Vietnam War. as well as those who participated in training or operations and came into contact with hazardous materials, will be able to enroll in VA health care.

The expansion of health care benefits was mandated by the PACT Act, signed into law by President Joe Biden in August 2022, which required the expansion to occur by 2032. VA officials said last month the acceleration is a result of a hiring blitz made possible by provisions in the law.


Under the PACT Act, over 100,000 veterans have enrolled in VA health care and roughly 760,000 disability claims have been approved. VA officials did not detail exactly how many veterans now will be eligible for care under the expansion but said the figure is in the "millions."

The expansion allows all veterans who deployed to combat zones in support of the Vietnam, Persian Gulf, Iraq, and Afghanistan wars to enroll in VA health care. In addition, veterans who never deployed but were exposed to pollutants while participating in a known "toxic exposure risk activity," or TERA, either in the U.S. or abroad, will be eligible. That would include exposure while on active duty, active-duty training or inactive-duty training to: air pollutants from burn pits, particulate matter, sulfur or oil well fires; chemicals such as pesticides, herbicides, contaminated water or depleted uranium from embedded shrapnel: occupational hazards such as lead, industrial solvents, toxic paint, asbestos and firefighting foam; radiation, including nuclear weapons handling, maintenance and detonation, X-rays and occupational exposure; and chemical or

According to the VA, the department will use service records and other resources to determine whether a veteran participated in a TERA. Veterans are not required to have a serviceconnected disability or file a compensation claim to be eligible for VA care.

New enrollees will have access to a toxic exposure screening provided by their primary care physician and may be referred to specialty care depending on need. They also will be assessed for placement in the VA's priority-based health system and referred to the Veterans Benefits Administration if they qualify for additional benefits.

The Veterans Health Administration has set a goal to hire 52,000 employees this fiscal year, which, when factoring in attrition, should grow its workforce by 3%. The increases could help to absorb new patients, meet demand, and standardize -- or even improve -- wait times. The VA is encouraging veterans to apply for care or benefits by visiting the VA.gov/ PACT website or calling 1-800-MYVA411.




D-M RAO Meeting

This was the last Board meeting until September. RAO Director Charles Schable's wife is continuing to have health problems and it is impacting his ability to be present at the RAO office four days a week. The RAO has put out a call for a Deputy Director; the position requires a retired officer or chief. The position requires at least 2 days in the office per week and must have computer skills. In addition, a Technical Computer Support person is needed. A call was put out for a RAO Newsletter (quarterly, electronic) editor, but I (Polly) have volunteered. In addition, the office always needs volunteers who can "man" the reception desk and answer phones, even if just once a week. Hours are 0900 to 1400 (2 pm). Training is provided. Base News: The offices of the Wing Cdr and Operations could not make the meeting due to some unexpected problems. VITA is going gangbusters as it heads toward April 15, after which it will shut its doors till next year. Over 1800 state and 1700 federal returns have been submitted. Almost \$1 million in commercial tax preparation fees have been saved. Freedom Festival is scheduled for June; fireworks are included. The base is moving towards two annual large festivals and smaller ones monthly. The Exchange will have a May 3 Grand Reopening. April is Military Child Month and several events are planned. May will see a May 4 Beauty and Mother's Day events. After renovation, the Express will include a Hunts Bros make-your-pizza station. Coolers and snack aisles is scheduled for a redo. The Express will remain open the entire time. The Pharmacy is making a change in its training hours which currently close the facility one day a month. Starting in June, every Wednesday will have two-hour training and the Pharmacy will open at 0900. With Snowbird Season volunteers are needed. The April-June RAO Newsletter has gone out.

SAVAHCS Volunteer: The 8th Anniversary of Fisher House was celebrated. There will be a Last Roll Call Ceremony of Remembrance on Friday, April 12 from 1 p.m. to 2 pm. This honors the lives and sacrifices of SAVAHCS veterans who have passed away. Third week of April, where approximately 280 volunteers will be honored during A World of Difference, which will include a volunteer meeting and barbeque. Whole Health for veterans and staff has begun which includes Tai Chi and yoga. Van drivers are needed.
