Arlington National Cemetery Expansion Underway

I recently returned from a trip to Virginia, where I visited friends and family, and my husband's grave at Arlington National Cemetery. I am happy to report that the Southern Expansion construction project has made significant headway. The ANC website has an informative video on the project, which will include seamless access to the US Air Force Memorial, which sits at the head of the project.

The three-phase project began construction in September 2021 and is scheduled to be completed in 2028. Phase I. scheduled for completion in 2026, realigns Columbia Pike, modifies the S. Joyce Street intersection and the Columbia Pike/Washington Boulevard (Route 27) interchange. and replaces Southgate Road with a new segment of S. Nash Street. Construction of Phase II and Phase III of the Southern Expansion project is anticipated to occur over the next five years (spring 2023 through winter 2027) and will add more than 80,000 new internment opportunities.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

URGENT ACTION: The Senator Elizabeth Dole 21st Century Veterans Healthcare and Benefits Improvement Act (H.R. 8371), sponsored by Arizona Representative Juan Ciscomani, passed the House on Nov.18 by a 389-9 vote. MOAA analysis is the window to pass significant veterans' legislation is rapidly closing with the end of this legislative session, and immediate action by the Senate is <u>essential</u>. The bill addresses various programs, benefits, and services provided by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), including those related to health care, educational assistance, home loans, homelessness, and disability and memorial affairs.

2025 NDAA / FY2025 Budget

On December 7, the House and Senate released the negotiated text of the <u>2025 NDAA</u>, and considerable pressure exists to pass it, though some items remain in contention. The NDAA authorizes defense policies and supports program plans, while the FY25 appropriations bill will ultimately set the final topline and specific spending levels. The NDAA has a \$911.8 billion topline for the military and the Department of Energy.

MOAA reports the text "includes significant quality of life improvements for servicemembers and their families, expands and updates key benefit programs, and requires key reports designed to ensure continued, meaningful congressional oversight."

Military Pay Raise and Junior Enlisted Pay Increase: Junior enlisted pay increased by 14.5%, with an increase of 4.5% for all others.

Unaccompanied Housing: Improvements include authorizing the services to provide free broadband internet access to servicemembers residing in unaccompanied housing and expanding the DoD Housing Feedback System to include unaccompanied housing.

Basic Needs Allowance: An increase in the threshold from 150% to 200% of the federal poverty guidelines will increase the number of military families eligible for this vital assistance program.

Military Family Support: More child care coverage for military spouses seeking employment, a 100% discount for DoD child care providers for one child and reduced costs for additional children (standardizing the benefit across the departments), and upgrades to the portability of professional licenses of servicemembers and military spouses.

TRICARE and the Military Health System: Improvements include a referral waiver for servicemembers seeking physical therapy, nutrition, audiology, optometry, and podiatry services in military treatment facilities; the elimination of TRICARE contraception copays to align with federal requirements for commercial health plans; and licensure flexibility allowing

TRICARE mental health providers to provide tele-mental health care to servicemembers and their families without regard to the location of the provider or the patient.

Travel Expense Reimbursement: Effective in January 2027, DoD must reimburse reserve component travel and some related expenses for servicemembers who travel over 50 miles to inactive duty training (IDT) and muster duty.

At press time, the bill passed the House 281 to 140. In contention was a last minute provision by Speaker Johnson regarding treatment of transgender youth that nearly derailed passage. The Senate must pass the bill before it can be signed by President Biden.

Congress has been unable to reach a final agreement on the FY2025 spending bills, and the government is facing another potential shutdown. The current Continuing Resolution (CR) must be passed by December 20.

Republican and Democrat leaders signal they are resigned to another CR; what is in contention is its length. The President must propose his FY26 budget in early February. If a CR is still in effect, it risks throwing next year's budget process into disarray. Lawmakers must pass a final FY25 spending bill by the end of April 2025 or face across-the-board FY25 spending cuts to both defense and domestic programs (known as "sequestration"). The current CR already operates with an across-the-board cut to FY24 levels.

Next Year

On January 3, the US Senate and House of Representatives will reconvene. Representative Ruben Gallego, a former Marine Corps Lance Corporal who served two combat tours in Iraq, will be sworn in as Arizona Senator. He will join Senator Mark Kelly, a retired Navy Captain, in representing Arizona's interests in Washington. In our Catchment Area, Representative Raul Grijalva will start his final term, and Representative Juan Ciscomani will begin his second term.

President-elect Donald Trump will be sworn into office on January 20, 2025. Hopefully, the weather will be mild. The President-elect has nominated a full slate of Cabinet appointees. However, it is unclear how many will make it through the Senate confirmation process, as numerous nominations are contentious, even with the incoming Republican majority. All in all, over 2,000 political appointees will need to be confirmed by the Senate.

Arizona Update

Senator David Gowan (R), District 19, and Representative Stacy Travers (D), District 12, have expressed their willingness to reintroduce legislation supporting state income tax parity for USPHS officers serving in Arizona. Senator Gowan has already started the process, and there should be an actual bill number soon. Please express your support to Sen Gowan at DGOWAN@AZLEG.GOV and Rep Travers at STRAVERS@AZLEG.GOV.

Governor Hobbs named John Scott II the Arizona Department of Veterans Services Director. His bio is at https://dvs.az.gov/about/leadership/john-scott. The ADVS Director is a critical leadership position for protecting veterans' rights at the state level. It is extremely important to have a confirmed and permanent Director to ensure that ADVS serves the needs of Arizona veterans. The Arizona Senate has established a committee to oversee all nominations. AZ Sen. Jake Hoffman is the chairman. Contact Sen. Hoffman (JAKE.HOFFMAN@AZLEG.GOV / (602) 926-3292) and ask him to support Arizona veterans by asking his committee to approve Mr. Scott's nomination when the committee meets in January.

Surviving Spouse & Personal Affairs

In the short time I've served as Tucson Chapter Surviving Spouse Liaison, there has been much to celebrate with MOAA's tireless advocacy. In 2021, the Arizona Legislature exempted military pensions, annuities, and other veterans' compensation from state income tax. Also, in 2021, the onerous and unfair Widows Tax was repealed. The PACT Act was signed in August 2022, and the VA has proactively expanded its coverage creatively. MOAA has actively worked with the VA and DoD to protect compensation and quality of life benefits for active duty, their families, retirees, Surviving Spouses, and all veterans and their dependents. The negotiated 2025 NDAA boosted enlisted personnel pay by 14.5% and increased the BNA from 150% to \$200%, among other benefits. It truly has exemplified "Never Stop Serving."

I worry that the next few years will not be so provident for our military and retiree community. We must gird ourselves for the battles ahead. National elections are temporary jousting, but budgetary fiats can take decades to reverse. It appears that nothing is off the cutting table, and all of a sudden, crypto, the "cloud," and manned missions to Mars are seriously prioritized as economic imperatives by the incoming Executive Branch.

I live in the real world, which is comprised of real people and real problems. Yesterday, I received a letter from MOAA President Brian Kelly asking for donations to The MOAA Foundation to strengthen the new Crisis Relief Program, which, in the past year, has helped over 300 active-duty service members, veterans, caregivers, and survivors recover from unprecedented natural disasters. I will, along with a donation to our local chapter tax-deductible ROTC Scholarship Fund. I ask you to join me.
