## FROM THE EAGLES NEST

The Tucson MOAA Chapter Board elected me President for 2026. For those of you who don't know me personally, I am the surviving spouse of George L. Cajigal, USA, COL, Ret. Unless you served with George, you probably don't know him. He started out as a draftee in 1968, got into OCS at Belvoir, and served a tour in Vietnam. George spent a large portion of his career with the 82nd Airborne at Ft. Bragg as a combat engineer and master parachutist (a funny Honduran story is associated with that). As a colonel, he moved into leadership roles at USACE, the Pentagon, and as the Wilmington District Engineer. His final year was back at Bragg, working for the Command General.

George was born in Havana and came to the US at 13. He was attending a military school in Cuba, and boy, did he love the US public education system. Football! Girls! Drama Club! He loved the Army, too, once he got to Bragg and commanded troops. He had deep respect for NCOs. He was proud and grateful to have helped build the volunteer force.

We met and married several years after he retired. His second career was as a DoD support contractor in a program that

neutralized the chemical, biological, and nuclear weapons of the Cold War, mainly in the former USSR, with a few other locations as well.

We had a blended family. My son, his two daughters, and his son. George's son served a tour in the US Army and was in Germany when the Soviet Union collapsed, and the Wall came down. One of his three sons is finishing a tour with the 11th Airborne and should be coming home from Alaska soon.

George was a long-time member of TROA/MOAA, and once we both retired and moved to Florida, he got involved with the local MOAA chapter and our county's Veteran Affairs Committee. I got roped into doing the bi-monthly newsletter for the 37-chapter Florida Council of Chapters. That is where I really learned what MOAA does and how important these chapters can be for their local communities, state, and the nation.

I don't have a magic formula for reviving this Chapter. But I think one thing we need to do is start talking up the Chapter with friends, acquaintances, and, yes, even strangers. There are several thousand MOAA National members in our catchment area, and we need to start finding them to make the work of this

# Budget & Legislative Update

**FEDERAL:** The FY26 NDAA was signed into law on December 18, but remains unfunded till Defense Appropriations passes Congress and is signed into law. It does contain some key provisions that address Quality of Life and procurement and acquisition reform. MOAA's Brendon McMahon has a publicly available [article](#) on the MOAA website about how a potential shutdown would affect services, service members, and their families.

The current Continuing Resolution for the FY26 budget will expire on January 30, 2026. Outside of MilCon and the VA, the FY2026 military-related appropriation bills have not passed. Negotiations, already difficult, have been further thrown into chaos by the Trump Administration's recent military blockade and the extraction of Venezuelan President Maduro without Congressional approval. President Trump is publicly pushing for further military actions on every continent except Australia and Antarctica. Thus far, the services have complied with minimal "boots on the ground."

On January 7, the President announced his goal of a \$1.5 trillion defense budget for FY2027, a \$500 billion increase over the yet-unpassed FY26 defense budget. Like the Administration's proposed FY26 budget, it is a "lite" budget, with line-item funding unspecified. Passage of such a massive increase is not guaranteed. Congress will have to grapple with the impact of the 2025 tax cuts on federal revenue as it weighs domestic priorities.

Putting the cart before the horse, on January 7, President Trump signed an [Executive Order Prioritizing the Warfighter in Defense Contracting](#), which goes far beyond the NDAA. It is well worth reading the EO in its entirety. The EO, which seeks to ramp up production of armaments, supplies, and equipment, acknowledges that defense

contracting allows for a [specified] profit margin, but apparently seeks to seize that profit non-contractually and without Congressional or judicial concurrence.

Directed to unnamed large publicly held corporations doing business with the Defense Department and the service branches, the EO targets their business models and operations by dictating, "Effective immediately, they are not permitted in any way, shape, or form to pay dividends or buy back stock, until such time as they are able to produce a superior product, on time and on budget."

Initially, it appears the president is targeting Raytheon, which has a product line focused on building missiles. Raytheon is a subsidiary of RTX Corp., which delivers products and services to defense and commercial entities, both domestically and internationally. On January 7, the President's social media office released a scathing statement on his Truth Social account, naming Raytheon and criticizing the company for apparently not building missiles fast enough. The post stated that, until the company invested in additional production facilities, it would not be allowed to pay dividends or undertake stock buybacks. Because Raytheon is not a stand-alone company but part of a larger publicly held corporation, this raises numerous legal, contractual, political, and economic questions.

**Major Richard Star Act:** The standoff between Republican leadership and their members over scheduling another vote continues. The Major Richard Star Act is a key priority of [The Military Coalition](#). As the year goes on, members and non-members of MOAA can use its [Legislative Action Center](#) to support veteran legislation and protect earned benefits on this and other priorities. Let's keep the momentum going.

# The Tucson MOAA LTC John A. Devine Scholarship Program

A great way to recognize our Veterans for the sacrifices and dedication required by service in the United States Armed Forces is to help financially support the tax-deductible Tucson MOAA LTC John A. Devine Scholarship Program, which currently awards three annual \$2,000 scholarships to University of Arizona ROTC cadets or midshipmen.

This scholarship provides support to ROTC cadets in their freshman or sophomore years who have financial need to help pay for college expenses. Over the years, a number of cadets have left ROTC programs in their first two years for financial reasons. Many would have stayed and become officers in our Armed Forces if they had received a little financial assistance. Unfortunately, if a cadet or midshipman is not on a service scholarship, there is no financial support from the service during their freshman or sophomore years.

We are happy to accept any donation to help an ROTC cadet or midshipman. You can also sponsor a "Named Scholarship" in honor of or in remembrance of a particular Veteran who served in a specific branch of the Armed Forces. For a donation of at least \$500, we recognize the Veteran by presenting a University of Arizona cadet or midshipman with scholarship money and a certificate named for or in remembrance of the Veteran.

At our April luncheon, we present the scholarship to the cadet or midshipman along with a certificate. The family or friends of any "Named Scholarship" will receive a letter from the Tucson MOAA Chapter President notifying them of the scholarship presentation and providing a brief description of the recipient.



For a "Named Scholarship," we ask that you provide a brief history of the Veteran's service so we can honor them in the presentation.

Below are the criteria the Tucson MOAA Chapter Board Members and ROTC Unit Commanders use for selection.

## Criteria for the Tucson MOAA LTC John A. Devine Scholarship Program

The selection of recipients within a particular Service ROTC program will be at the discretion of the program's commander. The criteria requested by the MOAA Tucson Board follow:

- The recipient should have a financial need as determined by the Commander.
- The recipient should be either a freshman or sophomore at the University of Arizona or Pima Community College and enrolled in a U of A ROTC program.
- The recipient should be in good standing both academically and with cadet corp participation.
- The recipient should have made positive contributions within the corp for the betterment of the ROTC program.
- The recipient should use the monetary

- award to defray expenses with the Bursa's Office directly related to attending a University of Arizona academic program.
- The recipient should be available, if possible, to attend the MOAA Tucson Chapter annual scholarship awards luncheon along with his/her parent(s), or unit Commander, with the luncheon costs paid by the MOAA Tucson Chapter.

issued license and a basic VA physical are required.

### **VA to Begin Copayments for Whole Health Well-being Services**

VA updated its billing practices for Whole Health well-being services to ensure consistency with federal law. Veterans in Priority Groups 6, 7, and 8, who are already responsible for outpatient copayments, will now pay a \$15 copayment for Whole Health well-being services billed under Stop Code 139.

This change applies only to Veterans who are already subject to outpatient copayments. Veterans exempt from copayments—such as those with service-connected conditions rated 50% or higher, those receiving care for a service-connected condition, or those meeting other statutory exemptions—will not be affected.

#### *What is changing?*

Whole Health well-being services, including guided imagery, meditation, yoga for well-being, tai chi/qigong, and health coaching, will carry a \$15 copayment.

The change is being applied uniformly across VA facilities to ensure compliance with federal regulations.

#### *What is not changing?*

Whole Health services are not being reduced or eliminated.

Veterans exempt from copayments remain exempt. Complementary and Integrative

Health treatments, such as acupuncture and clinical hypnosis, continue under existing billing practices.

#### *Why is VA making this change?*

Since 2017, Whole Health well-being services have been set as non-billable. A proposed regulation to exempt them was published in January 2025, but was later withdrawn. VA updated its billing practices to align with statutory requirements.

#### *Where can I get more information?*

Veterans with questions or concerns can contact their local VA Medical Center's Patient Advocate or Finance representative, who can explain how the change applies and review eligibility for copayment exemptions.

## INCOME TAXES

### **SOCIAL SECURITY STILL TAXABLE BUT SENIORS OVER 65 HAVE A NEW DEDUCTION**

Social Security is still taxable under the new tax law for years 2025-2028. The new tax law includes an additional \$6,000 deduction for seniors age 65 and older, which can potentially reduce the taxable portion of your benefits. Joint filers that are both over 65 would have an additional \$12,000 deduction. This deduction phases out for single filers with an adjusted gross income (AGI) exceeding \$75,000 and joint filers with an AGI over \$150,000. No deduction will apply if a single filer AGI exceeds \$175,000 and if a joint filer AGI exceeds \$250,000. *(This information is from the VANCE AFB, OK RAO Newsletter.*

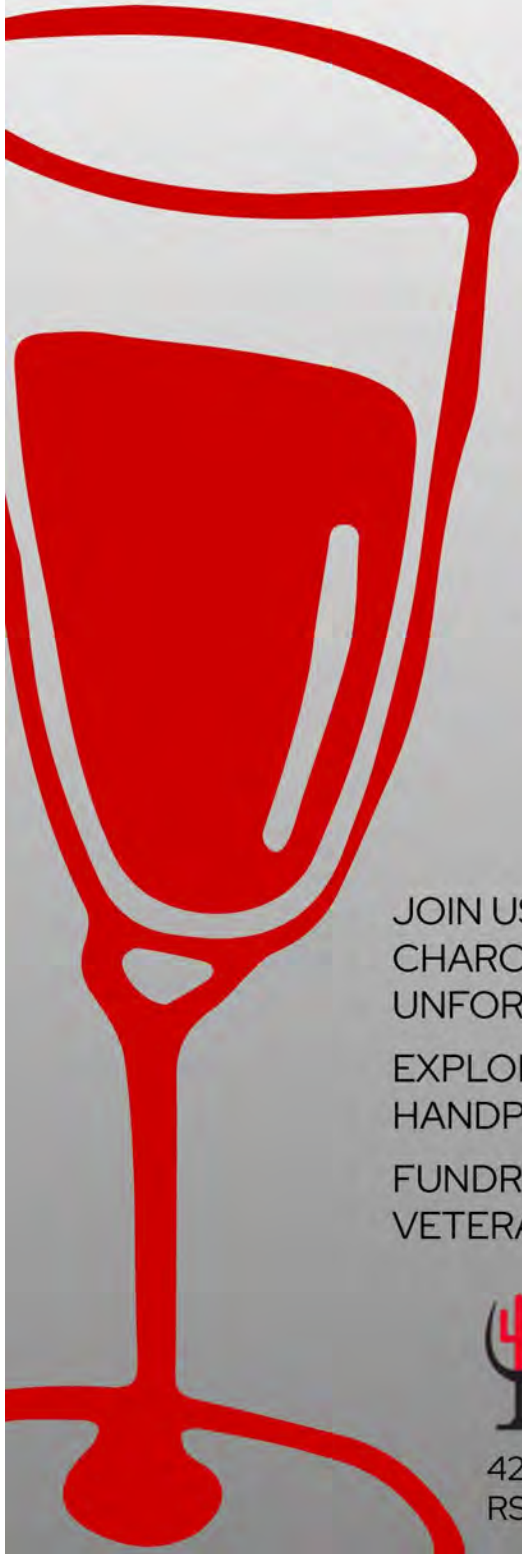
